- 1. I find it best to travel in daylight when possible.
- 2. Be aware of your alertness and stop as often as needed. Your person with Parkinson's will appreciate the stretch and facility breaks.
- 3. When taking a rest stop, be sure to rest. Even a 5-minute cat nap can do wonders.
- 4. Remember safety is #1—as always with Parkinson's, unpredictable events happen. Know that even if you might not get there when you want, you will get there.
- 5. Set aside a supply of medications to be kept in the car. Carry them in a bubble-wrapped envelope to keep in a cooler during hot weather.
- 6. Carry your favorite light snacks and drinks with you.
- 7. Audiobooks or podcasts have a way of making time go by fast and easy: pick them out and download ahead of time.
- 8. Bring comfort items like pillows and back support.
- 9. Enjoy your time together whether you find yourself talking, listening, or just being silent and in the moment together.
- 10. We enjoy finding great places along the way—some of them unexpected such as the American Gothic House, Butch Cassidy's boyhood home, and John Wayne's birthplace. A little research or an impromptu stop might yield big benefits!
